## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



Globally, we are seeing a significant degradation of the world's natural environment. This is mostly due to the rapid increase in human population over the decades. This has put pressure on our natural world as people fight to utilise its precious resources. There is an urgent need for action, which has been echoed by many others over the years. Without action, we will continue to see biodiversity loss, habitat degradation, global warming, encroachment into conservation areas and an increase in poverty.

Often it is local communities that are most vulnerable, especially when it comes to climate change. A healthy environment and use of natural resources are essential to human well-being, as well as social and economic developments. This is due to their importance in supporting livelihoods, food security and tourism. However, these ecosystems are vulnerable to such activities as overfishing, deforestation and pollution.

Another challenge for many marginalized communities is access to quality education. Figures have shown that children are less likely to attend school in rural areas, if they are poor, or if their parents received minimal education, and this only exacerbates problems further.

The Conservation Education Society (CES), established in March 2019, operates in Kwale County, Kenya. CES hopes to address the above through set goals, these being;



## BACKGROUND



The Conservation Education Society (CES) was officially established in March 2019 and between 2019 and 2021 and operated out of the Marine Education Centre (MEC) in Diani, Kenya. CES continues to work with students and communities offering conservation awareness and education. This is achieved through several outreach programmes, online programmes and in partnership with other like-minded organisations. CES plans to span out of Kwale County, to work and collaborate on conservation education activities throughout Kenya, with a vision of supporting and developing education centres and programmes in several key locations throughout Kenya.

Although the Society was established in 2019, work had already started much earlier, in October 2018. CES founders partnered with the MEC with two main objectives; to educate guests, students and as many people as possible in marine conservation and sustainability and; to create a network of partners within conservation, helping support, strengthen and expose the fantastic work that goes on along Kenya's coastline.


Three years on and CES has achieved a substantial amount in a short time. So far, nearly 1,500 students, from both local and international schools, have got involved in CES education programmes. Furthermore, very early on in the project, a small committee of dedicated and conservation-minded teachers from the Kwale district was formed. The committee worked on developing educative resources which compliment the Kenyan curriculum as well as exposing students to local wildlife and conservation. CES hopes that this will not only bring forward a new generation of conservation-minded individuals, but will also help improve exam scores in Kwale County

Other achievements include the implementation of an afterschool marine club in a nearby vocational centre; the creation of the Diani Sea Turtle Festival, held in celebration of World Sea Turtle day in June; an international programme for UK students through our partnership with Camps International and an outreach education programme in partnership with the Kwale Recycling Centre.

Another vital part of our work has been to support local conservation organisations. So far, the society has established partnerships with Local Ocean Conservation, Diani Turtle Watch, REEFolution Foundation, Olive Ridley Project and the Kwale Recycling Centre. CES aims to support these noble causes through increasing awareness of these projects to the public, which is achieved through both social media and CES education programmes. The second aim is to assist financially, which is achieved through sponsorship schemes and donations.



## CONSERVATION AND EDUCATION CHALLENGES IN KENYA



Kenya's human population has significantly increased over the decades, from 10 million in 1969 to over 48 million in 2016. This dramatic population growth has placed significant pressure on environmental resources such as, water, land, forests and fisheries. As a result, this has posed challenges to sustainable environmental management and food security. Furthermore, this has accelerated degradation of protected areas and fragile ecosystems. The Ministry of Environment and Mineral Resources have identified several threats for the implementation of sustainable development and reduction in biodiversity loss, this being political will for environmental conservation, encroachment into conservation areas, poverty and unemployment, and natural resource use.

It has been repeatedly identified that more needs to be done to incentivize communities in protecting wildlife and natural ecosystems, as few of Kenya's Protected Areas are self-sufficient ecological units, meaning there is a major need to secure dispersion areas. Furthermore, the ministry's strategies for conservation include promotion of sustainable and affordable technologies in environmental management, securing wildlife corridors and migratory routes, securing fragile ecosystems and the promotion of education and awareness initiatives.

Climate change is another important area and presents the biggest threat to development, this is due to sea levels rising, deforestation and the unsustainable use of natural resources, to name a few. This makes many marginalized communities vulnerable to the effects of climate change, such as flooding and droughts. Healthy ecosystems are essential to human well-being, as well as social and economic development. This is due to their importance in supporting livelihoods, food security and tourism. Although there has been an increase in protection of natural areas, this has not necessarily targeted catchment areas for biodiversity, therefore more needs to be done to protect these areas.

The importance of both education and the environment has been recognized globally and has been highlighted within the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). Figures have shown that children are less likely to attend school in rural areas, if they are poor, or if their parents received minimal education. Shockingly, less than 50% of students in Kwale County graduate to secondary school. There is a need for high quality and multidimensional education.



## CONSERVATION AND EDUCATION CHALLENGES IN KENYA



All of this highlights the need for conservation education and community participation to help protect the environment. It is well understood that both sustainable development and education are vital for both communities and individuals to improve their own lives and to make a positive impact on the natural environment. Without such education, people will lack the tools, resources and knowledge to make educated choices on land use and wildlife management. Many studies have shown that instilling a love for nature within children can influence attitude and behaviour towards natural habitats in later life. Our goals align with 6 of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, see below.









### **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**

To run a minimum of 3 workshops per year to students, with topics varying from podcast development to photography, and more.

To have established a free conservation education centre and an office in Kwale County.

To have assisted in the development of at least 3 new centres in Kenya in the next 5 years.

## 2. ENGAGING WITH OUR LOCAL COMMUNITY

### **GOAL**

To work with a community group neighbouring a mangrove forest, to help restore and protect the forest as well as generate new jobs

### **ACTIVITIES**

To set up regular meetings and workshops with community members.

To fund the initial assessment of the area for mangrove restoration.

To explore money generating opportunities for the community, with particular focus on women.

To train community members in mangrove tree planting.

## **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**

To have an established partnership with 2 local community groups who engage in mangrove forest restoration and protection, supporting their efforts through fundraising, awareness and training.





### GOAL ACTIVITIES

To continue running the Diani Sea Turtle Festival annually To organise and execute a 1day sea turtle awareness festival each June for the Kwale community.

To secure funding for the event through sponsorship packages.

To organise several educational and fun activities for the day to engage people of all ages. To have an established and well attended sea turtle festival in Diani annually, which is attended by a minimum of 200 students, of which all expenses are covered through business sponsorship.

**EXPECTED OUTCOMES** 

To develop awareness campaigns for our community relating to damaging environmental activities and human/wildlife interactions To identify the most challenging or damaging environmental activities occurring along the coast through surveys. From this data, create awareness campaigns to help reduce such activities and behaviours.

To have identified with at least 3 environmental challenges for the coast and to have created awareness campaigns on each over the next 5 years.

To support environmentally friendly businesses which are community owned

To identify community groups in Kenya that have an environmentally friendly business or idea.

To support these businesses through funding, training, purchases and marketing.

To have identified a minimum of 5 community groups and to have supported them through funding, training, marketing etc.
